We ran a medal test that catered for 3 clubs in February & hope to do the same in November. We will be involved in the Spooks & Sparks event again this year.

We would like to launch a beginner event in memory of Gillian Taylor, however efforts have been put into ensuring we can cover our expenses as we faced increased costs, venue availability difficulties & our volunteers are at capacity. Hopefully we can get this off the ground in 2025
How many Recreational Skating activities do you hold per week / per year?	We consider our classes recreational, and this year we have been fortunate to have less outages, so these will run for 39 weeks, when this would usually be 34. Hopefully we will get to hold a Fun Skate in December.

HRSC Report 2024

2023 and 2024 has seen a mix of highs and lows for The Hamilton Roller Skating Club.

The low being the fire which caused considerable damage ...some of which is still in the process of being fixed

One of the 'Highs' was the response to a 'Give a Little' page set up by one of our Club members to help with the cost of the damage not covered by insurance. We were stunned, not only by the generous monetary support for which we are very grateful, but also all of the wonderful comments from the members of the public, the Mayor, the Deputy Mayor, other Clubs and members of the skating fraternity from around the country. We even had people turning up at public sessions putting money on the counter saying, "This is to help with the fire". It was humbling to hear, "You guys are amazing, and we just want to help," from the public at large who enjoy the facility.

The money has gone into a dedicated account, and should we end up with a surplus after expenses, it will be transferred to a 'vandalism' account, just in case anything untoward should happen in the future.

A positive from the fire is increased Council awareness of the vandalism on the park surrounding our rink with increased lighting being erected in the area. It certainly feels safer leaving at night.

Another high has been the recent completion of extensions to our Clubrooms which has been project managed by Kathy Moody, a Trustee and Club Treasurer. We now have space to keep valuable equipment in a secure, almost fortress style addition. We have a dedicated kitchen area, a large area for storage plus work- bench space and equipment for maintaining our hire skates

Costs have been kept to a minimum and funded 100% by the Public Sessions we run.

These Public Sessions, run entirely by volunteers, not only provide recreational skating for the people of Hamilton and outlying areas, but they also support and subsidize our competitive speed and artistic skaters.

- They allow us to keep our Club fees to a minimum- \$23.00 per child and Adults \$35.00.
- They allow Club skaters to pay nothing for dedicated 'Practice Time'.
- They allow the Club to pay our competitive skater's Area and National entry fees. Our skaters pay nothing for these competitions.
- All competitive skaters get an equal share of funds raised at our Fundraising Theme Nights run by both Speed and Artistic.

- Our International Skaters (Speed and Artistic) also get an equal share of the Sponsorship secured by the Club from 'Summerset Retirement Villages.'
- Additional grants are made from Club funds to each Skater making an International Team. \$300 for NZ based competition and \$500 for offshore.

Despite there being some misunderstanding in the skating Community about HRSC fundraising Policies, our skaters both competitive and non- competitive are well looked after as we strive to keep the sport affordable.

Our Club is indeed fortunate to have had our life member Kathy Moody raise over \$1.2 million over twenty years to build our facility in stages, without incurring debt. Our thanks also go out to the volunteers, who rain, hail, and shine, run public sessions and learn - to -skate sessions with no financial benefit for themselves. Thanks in particular to Lyn Ashton who manages to recycle and keep our hire skates functioning despite many of them being decades old.

On that note, our Club is delighted to see the Federation recognising the benefit of recreational skating. Our public sessions continue to grow. They are well loved by the community as we keep costs low (\$3.00 entry and \$2.00 to hire for public sessions)

We run a Learn- to -Skate Session every week where Club Members and 2 of our Coaches giving their time freely to help the public with their skating skills. These are also kept to an affordable \$3.00 entry including skate hire. They attract up to 100 skaters a week. Our Saturday and Sunday sessions attract on an average between 300 to 500 skaters. We also have fortnightly sessions dedicated to Home- School families.

Whilst our Registered Competitive Artistic numbers are not growing, we have skaters learning Artistic Skating for their own enjoyment (particularly adult skaters who want to learn, have fun, and increase their skills but have no interest in competition). We are also finding that our Monthly Themed Fundraising Discos which are well supported by this group, are increasingly becoming 'social events' as well as fundraisers for our competitors.

Our numbers in Speed have grown significantly. Their pathway into competition is less complicated. We have had a number of children join, compete at National level and even place in under 12 months.

We wonder if the medal test pathway is a hinderance for children (especially in the 12 to 13 yr age group) into Artistic competition.

So, highs and lows in general. It's fun and satisfying to see the number of new adults enjoying our sport and the increasing numbers of whole families from the low socio-economic area in which we sit, turn up week after to week and tell us what it means to have supervised affordable sport and recreation available.

We are looking hard at what opportunities we can explore in the latter part of the year to keep our growing group of recreational skaters engaged, and pulling in regular skaters who at this stage are not necessarily Club members, to create and explore more fun times for all.

We still have the same six clubs in the region. There are the four clubs in Christchurch two clubs that are artistic clubs, two offering artist and speed disciplines. The other two are South Canterbury and Southern both speed clubs.

The reports of the clubs show they have been working hard to maintain their skaters and some increasing the skaters. The same concern is that it hard to get the skaters to move to being competition skaters. The speed clubs continue to run their annual inter club competition and South Canterbury run a Marathon Competition over a series of months.

These are an excellent opportunity to bring families into The Rink and often into the respective sections.</p> <p>Skate Fundraisers for NZ Teams and Skaters - We have had a number of our members represent NZ in the last year across all 3 disciplines. Members have held public skate sessions as fundraisers to support their endeavours.</p> <p>Artistic – Nothing here but attend others where they can.</p> <p>Rink Hockey – Wanganui Rink Hockey hosted a tournament over the Matariki Weekend with Clubs attending from Auckland, Hastings, New Plymouth, and Motueka. They have also hosted multiple training sessions for the NZ Women’s Team as well as youth training camps.</p> <p>Speed - Have held some Omnibus Competitions along with our annual RCT.</p>

We also run additional Fundraiser Sessions on a Saturday night when requested and also 2 extra sessions in the school holidays. We also have private booked sessions for school, youth groups of different varieties along with up to 3 birthday parties each week. Public session can be as high as 150 people but averages around say 60 skaters per session.</p> <p>We also run 2 learn to skate sessions per week, one for each of hockey and speed sub-sections. These can have 10-30 skaters attending.</p>

Recreational: Artistic has 2, Speed 14, Rink Hockey 20. Officials: Artistic have none, Speed 3, Rink Hockey 2. Artistic – Has seen some drop off in numbers and no longer run learn to skate with no one available to run Learn to Skates sessions. Hoping to get this back running next year. Because we don’t have a specific coach based in Wanganui, does make it hard to grow our skater numbers. Claudia does train some from PN.</p>

	<p>Speed - has seen some growth in Learn to Skate numbers but has been difficult getting new skaters to commit to training and competition.</p> <p>Rink Hockey - have continued to see good growth in both junior and senior grades. There has been a return of some previous senior members which has resulted in increased senior team entries by WRHC at RHNZ tournaments.</p>

Open Days, workshops, etc</p>	<p>Artistic – We have 4 skaters attending local area comps like Areas, Graeme Shepard and we had some skaters attending Nationals.</p> <p>Speed – Speed regularly attends other competitions, this year in Hamilton, Blenheim, Manawatu, Upper Hutt. We have had 1 skater at Worlds in Italy with him spending the year based in Germany for 6 months and competing in multiple events in Europe as part of Team Geisengin. He has also taken up Long Track Ice Speed Skating.</p> <p>Rink Hockey – Over the course of 2024 there were 5 tournaments held throughout New Zealand.
