Club Introduction	AWRSC service artistic skating in West Auckland
What have been your activities this year? (competitions, sessions, classes, Kiwi Skate Day etc)	Running weekly Learn to Skate Classes, hosting Regional & Area Championships, ran a session for Kiwi Skate Day. One of our coaches also ran two Youthtown School Holiday Programmes.
How well have they been going? What have been some successes or things learnt from them?	Learn to skate classes work well to teach basic skills to new skaters. We have grown our younger coaching crew and that helps to support the more senior coaches. We average around 45 skaters in classes each week. It's still difficult to continue to engage them skaters as the skills get harder and longer is required to achieve the level. This emulates the issue we have getting skaters from our classes to club level.
What are your numbers of skaters (club, classes & recreational as applicable)? You may specify by discipline if desired. Has there been growth? Can you identify the reasons for growth or decline?	We have 29 club skaters, Learn to Skate registrations are currently 116 for 2018 which includes adults and some club skaters that still attend classes. Only 2-3 recreational skaters. We have probably remained about the same. Our total LTS registrations for 2017 was 140, so we are likely to finish up about the same. We saw a significant jump in classes participation after running the Kiwi Skate Day event. We believe there would be good uptake of recreational skating in West Auckland on at least a 6monthly basis if we can manage with our venue. Our competitive club skater numbers have declined in part due to personal circumstances. We acknowledge that keeping skaters in their age grouping so they are able to socialise is extremely important for retention and we hope to do this for our next batch of teenagers.
How many Oceania / World Representatives do you have?	3 Oceania Representatives. No World Reps.
How do you encourage your Senior Skaters to keep involved? (Coaching, judging, refereeing, mentoring etc)	Mainly coaching, as we have lacked enough coaches to ensure progression from our classes to club level. Those who show more interest in judging we have tried to send in that direction, but there have been hurdles for them.

What challenges does your club face?	Outages at the stadium so our schedule is unstable...affects our classes and our preparation for competition. The stadium hire cost being \$115+ an hour means we can only realistically hire for 3 sessions. Access to other Auckland venues is also very limited.

How does your club interact with the Community?	Through our classes, visibility at Trusts Stadium and supporting the Youhtown School Holiday Programme. We have also helped the PCR Derby League with skate hire to help with their Youth programme.

Club Introduction	<p>We are a small club in the Top of the South Region. We offer speed skating, artistic, derby and learn to skate classes.</p>
<p>What have been your activities this year? (competitions, sessions, classes, Kiwi Skate Day etc)</p>	<p>For the first time since the late 90's artistic has returned to the Blenheim Roller Skating Club. They hold fortnightly classes with Sarah Stack from Nelson coming over to provide coaching. Speed skating still holds regular coaching sessions at different venues throughout Blenheim.</p> <p>Learn to skate classes continue every Tuesday night at the rink. We've held 2 competitions this year. For artistic we held the Top of the South Areas in May and for speed we had the Top of the South Tour followed up with a marathon in June.</p> <p>For Kiwi Skate Day we held a disco.</p> <p>Public sessions run every Sunday from 1 – 3pm and we hold a disco on the first Friday of every month.</p> <p>Every year we participate in the Blenheim Christmas parade and hand out lolly pops with a club sticker and contact information.</p>
<p>How well have they been going?</p> <p>What have been some successes or things learnt from them?</p>	<p>Artistic has regular numbers attending their fortnightly sessions but the issue they face at the moment is that they are different kids each time.</p> <p>Speed continues to grow slowly; we had a few new skaters this year who have been trying out speed skates for the first time. The top of the South Tour went well with over 60 skaters attending. We had great support from the community who contributed cash and spot prizes.</p> <p>For Kiwi Skate Day we held a disco which was quite popular and generated a bit of interest but we should have had more information available about club activities and held more demonstrations.</p> <p>Public session and disco numbers are low over the winter period but as the weather warms up, the people have started to return</p>

You may specify by discipline if desired.</p> <p>Has there been growth?</p> <p>Can you identify the reasons for growth or decline?</p>	<p>We have approximately 40 club members which is a slight increase on previous years. New members are encouraged from our learn to skate classes, from public sessions and disco's and with the introduction of artistic.</p> <p>Public skating sessions and learn to skate class numbers run in waves. During the Autumn we were experiencing high numbers but with the winter weather bringing rain we had to cancel a couple of sessions and this drives people away. As the weather warms up we notice the numbers increasing again.</p>

<p>How do you encourage your Senior Skaters to keep involved? (Coaching, judging, refereeing, mentoring etc)</p>	<p>Our oldest skater is 15 and our oldest competitive skater is 12. Both girls are really good at helping out with the younger skaters.</p> <p>While we don't currently have a derby team we still have 2 skaters from the previous team who help out a lot at the club with public sessions, working bees and on the committee.</p>
<p>Do you have ways of recruiting volunteers that have been successful?</p>	<p>Recruiting volunteers has been one of our biggest challenges. The parents who do get involved are amazing and we need more people like them.</p>
<p>What challenges does your club face?</p>	<p>Artistic: We have kids interested in giving the sport a go but it would be good to see some regular returnees.</p> <p>Speed: We also have a lot of kids interested who want to try speed skating and learn the skills but don't necessarily want to attend competitions outside of Blenheim.</p> <p>Derby: We have people come a long who are keen but they don't stick around</p> <p>Club: Getting people to help out with the Sunday sessions. We have a strong core group but need to get new members to sign up for the roster.</p>

Club Introduction	<p>Ham Roller skating Club has been in continuous operation for nearly 40 years. We own an International sized banked Track and a large rink which is secure and partially enclosed and under cover . We have club room and several hundred pair of hire skates. All of this is debt free we pay a fair ground rental to the Council.. The Hamilton City Council is very supportive because we have not called on ratepayers to subsidise our rink and provide low cost sessions for the public to enjoy.</p>
<p>What have been your activities this year? (competitions, sessions, classes, Kiwi Skate Day etc)</p>	<p>We run weekly learn to skate sessions; participated in Kiwi Skate ,Hold Public Sessions on Sunday morning which are massive with approx. 200 skaters regularly and also Thurs Nights sessions. We have speed training 3 nights a week and sent 11 skaters Nationals in Timaru .</p> <p>Our biggest team ever competed at the Banked Track Nationals held in Hamilton this year. Speed has a dedicated core of competitive skaters and attending training nights and aiming toward regional or national competitions. Here is also a growing number of beginners of all ages attending our club speed night and have competed in our local fun days this year.</p> <p>Events run: 2 day Hamilton banked track event in October 2018 (permitted event) 3 Speed Fun days run monthly from July to October with between 25 to 35 skaters attending from Manawatu, Wanganui, Mt Wellington and Hamilton.</p> <p>We have 2 artistic practice sessions with no charge to club members. Skaters being coached also can skate free on coaching nights. We have 3 coaches and sent approx. 20 skaters to Artistic Nationals in Wanganui competing across the disciplines including precision</p>
<p>How well have they been going?</p> <p>What have been some successes or things learnt from them?</p>	<p>Exceptionally well patronised, low cost, Public sessions subsidise our skaters. We do zero advertising except on Facebook and the majority of families come through of word of mouth. We also have a growing number of Chinese families bringing little ones along.</p> <p>There are no rink charges for practice times. Coaches who are deemed to be in business pay a proportion of their coaching to the rink Trust .</p>

Cost is a big factor. Someone said recently “ That’s the best fun Ive had for 4 bucks that I can remember.!”</p> <p>Informal’ Learn to Skate’ sessions. (basic skills) attract around 50 adults and children per session also continues to grow with no advertising. These only drop back a bit right at the end of the last term when everyone is busy</p> <p>Good growth in speed see above and also in artistic</p>
<p>How many Oceania / World Representatives do you have?</p>	<p>1 Masters this year, 1 associate member skating advanced Masters and a Junior speed skater. There was at least one other interested, but costs are a deterrent.</p>
<p>How do you encourage your Senior Skaters to keep involved?</p>	<p>We have one associate member judging and on the ARTS committee . plus the President. We have up to 7 helping on learn</p>

(Coaching, judging, refereeing, mentoring etc)	to skate sessions (several being ex competitive skaters) we have 4 professional coaches and 1 registered with another club and I associate. Others are gaining experience in marshalling and one has expressed interest in jnr. judging
Do you have ways of recruiting volunteers that have been successful?	Newsletters but mostly word of mouth. Yes Our Club could not exist without volunteers. We have a 6 weekly roster and at the beginning of the week, those rostered get a phone reminder.
What challenges does your club face?	Keeping spending under control and remembering the massive amount of money for repairs to our roof and flooring surface. Replacement of hire skates needs to be budgeted for. The Roster has been a problem in the past but currently running well . Getting people to hold executive positions because of the time involved. The secretary's role is massive. It becomes almost a full time job leading up to competition time, registration time and replacing numbers. It is nigh impossible when the Secretary has a demanding day job and our challenge has been how we can get both an Artistic and Speed person to co ordinate entries and payment into the correct club account. This has been a significant help to our secretary.
Are there any opportunities your club could take up?	Our floor is utilised to its maximum. When not being used by skaters its hired out to Floor ball and Derby. The downside of this is that it reduces practice and coaching time
How does your club interact with the Community?	We are in a low socio- economic area. The community appreciates our low costs and kids who show an aptitude for speed are helped by our speed coaches who buy skates and loan them out to new skaters free of charge. Parents also skate free of charge at the main rink. Learn to Skate Classes are kept affordable at \$3.00 per head.
Who are your Life Members? How have they been involved in your club this year?	Lyn Ashton runs sessions, repairs skates and serves on both the Committee and Trust. He also helps with rink maintenance. Pearl Best our secretary of 37 yrs recently retired, serves on our Trust, mentors our Committee, helps at sessions and enjoys coming down to training sessions to watch the kids. Kathy Moody who was instrumental in building our rink, continues to run sessions and help with speed.
Any further comments you'd like to make?	We work really hard to keep costs down for our families. We would like to see the Federation, the ARTS Committee more mindful of costs and spending and also to address the amount of paperwork and requests to our Secretary. We would like to see the see more work on streamlining communications and reduce the amount of request, forms to fill out etc as it is increasingly difficult to find people who have time to give to the increasing demands of their time.
