However our club environment is positive, and we hope to increase our solo skater numbers over the next few years.

We ran our first club competition which was for beginners. This was attended by 80 skaters from beginners to Novice 2 & was a great success. We tried a school holiday programme session in conjunction with a local business. It wasn't as successful as we'd have hoped as they didn't capture the numbers expected & then reneged on the minimum rate.

2025 Manawatū Skating Club Report for MSSC AGM

Manawatū Skating Club (MSSC) covers both disciplines of Artistic and Inline Speed skating. Once again, the last year has seen our skaters, across both disciplines achieving highly both in placings in events and in personal best performances. We congratulate all our skaters and coaches, it is rewarding to see all the hard work and dedication pay off and thank you to the parents and volunteers that keep the club running.

We were pleased to be able to partner with Te Manawa Museum last September to celebrate the club history as part of an exhibition of Manawatū Sports Clubs, the Museum holds a collection of Manawatū skater Avis Berry memorabilia from her international skating career in the 1950's & 60's. We took the opportunity to promote the club and enjoyed introducing museum visitors to our sport.

In terms of our Artistic Rollerskating achievements over the last year we've recently had a team of 11 skaters compete at the recent NZ Champs in Blenheim (unfortunately two of our international level skaters were unable to skate due to injury). Overall the team brought home 7 gold medals, 7 silver and 4 bronze. We are always super proud of how supportive our skaters are of their own team and of other skaters.

On top of the medals, Phoenix Reid received the Jack Fanthorpe Memorial Fund having achieved the most in national and international competition senior events, Phoenix also shared the Avis Berry Trophy for Most Senior Points with two other senior skaters.

We were pleased to see Sonja Reid recognised for her amazing voluntary contribution to the sport, particularly as the National Trophy Steward, she was awarded the Volunteer of the Year trophy.

A highlight of the last year was seeing two of our skaters selected to represent New Zealand at the World Championships, and the Figure World Cup. Phoenix Reid competed in the Senior Ladies Solo Dance at the World Championships and also competed in Senior Ladies Figures at the Figure World Cup. Ben Shirley competed in Junior Men's Solo Dance at the World Championships, congratulations to Ben and Phoenix,

and to their coach Kylie Shirley. MSSC members Kylie Shirley and Sonja Reid volunteered as Team Management for the World Figure Cup. Ben and Phoenix will once again be representing New Zealand at the upcoming World Champs and World Figure Cup in September.

Along with these higher-level competitions, we have had great success at the Graeme Sheppard Challenge, the Central Area Championships, Regional Champs, and our own annual competition, Laurie Hastie Open Day held in June. Offering the roll art events, 80 skaters competed from as far north as Auckland and Tauranga and south to Christchurch. Thank you to all the club volunteers who made the event possible, as always, it was a big undertaking and a very cold weekend! A Laurie Hastie Figure workshop held in August 2024 was very popular and we will look to run similar workshops in the future.

Artistic Learn to Skate remains a popular extracurricular activity in Palmerston North, with several skaters moving up to extra lessons to prepare for their first competitions. We have had 53 skaters register for Learn to Skate in Terms 1 & 2 this year and are grateful to the volunteers that keep Learn to Skate alive. Thank you to Demelza George Franzmayr and Kylie Shirley and to all the coaches involved with Learn to Skate.

Thank you to Nicole Silver for continuing to manage and coach Adult Learn to Skate and three of her skaters competed in the MSSC Beginners event at Laurie Hastie.

We thank all our coaches, Kylie, Phoenix, Lisa, Nicole, Linnea, Claudia, Jessica and Esta, without you we wouldn't have a sport and we appreciate you very much.

And 2025 has been another big year for Speed.

Our Speed Learn to Skate classes are steadily attended, with a few skaters graduating to Squad level, and some opting to compete for the first time.

Nathan Bedford resigned as Assistant Coach at the end of 2024, along with Paula Bedford – our superstar administrator, and Head Coach, Rebecca Gennills left earlier this year to have her first baby. Thank you to them all for their contributions.

Katie McIlhatton is now Head Coach, with assistance from Lachie and Reilly Richards, and Sarah Bell steps into the Head Coach role as needed. Clare McIlhatton and Sarah Richards continue to support with administration, a big thanks to them also.

Our Speed Squad numbers have remained consistent, but we have lost some senior and junior level skaters this year, leaving us in a rebuilding phase with younger experienced skaters, and new, inexperienced skaters.

Squad coaching has been shared between Andy McDonell and Graeme Fox, with the addition of Terry Hong running off skate sessions on Saturday mornings. A big thanks to all three of you for your skills, knowledge and the time you devote to our Squad each week.

In terms of competitions we have had a rather wet season with some competitions being postponed or part of them being cancelled due to the wet weather.

Our Speed skaters have had great results at competitions such as Speed King in Wellington, which provided an interesting experience for skaters who competed in Stage One on the Concourse at the Sky Stadium with many of our skaters placing in the top five in their grades. Fifteen skaters competed in the River City Tour in Whanganui. Again competitors skated at Whanganui Airport but were only interrupted once for an incoming flight.

2025 Road and Flat Track Nationals were held in January, with MSSC hosting Road at Memorial Park and Whanganui hosting Flat Track at Jubilee Stadium, followed by a combined effort to host the National Marathon at Manfield Park in Feilding. We had 13 skaters compete.

Garry Bedford sat and passed his level 3 Speed Official exam at Nationals and continues to officiate Speed events.

Despite rain forcing the cancellation of some events, our team came away with 3 golds, 3 silver and 3 bronze for the Road Championships, and for Flat Track - 3 golds, 3 silver and 4 bronze, and all our relay teams won bronze medals. Overall, our club came fifth at Nationals. A huge thank you to Paula Bedford for working with the Speed Committee to make this event happen.

We had four skaters compete at the National Marathon in cold and sometimes wet conditions. Katie McIlhatton gained a bronze in the ladies 42km marathon and Nathan Bedford came away with a strong 5th in the men's 42km.

The 2025 Banked Tracks were held in Timaru in February. Nathan Bedford and Katie McIlhatton attended from our club. Nathan earned 1 silver and 2 bronze medals and Katie skated well in a strong junior ladies' group. Sadly that weekend we received the news that Gary Clark, Whanganui skate coach, had passed away after an operation for cancer. Gary was well known to Squad skaters, with many attending combined Wanganui MSSC training sessions, and competitions over the years. We learned a lot from Gary, and he will be sadly missed.

We ended the season with our own Laurie Hastie competition in February, which attracted 33 skaters from as far south as the Hutt Valley through to Hamilton in the north. 11 MSSC skaters competed earning a total of 14 golds, 3 silver and 3 bronze across Road and Flat Track events. The Roger Croad Memorial Open was won by Andy McDonnell, Katie McIlhatton won the Laurie Hastie Memorial Open, Matthias Ko won the male Junior Open, and Nina Ricketts came 2nd in the female Junior Open.

This year 2025 Oceanias was cancelled for Speed Skating, but skaters could apply for selection to the New Zealand team to compete at the Asian Games in South Korea in July. Katie McIlhatton successfully secured a place on the team and competed in the 500m track event and the 100m road sprint for Junior Ladies. Despite the very hot temperatures, Katie gained a personal best for the 100m sprint – well done Katie!

We would like to thank our coaches, volunteers, families and supporters who consistently turn up for our Speed skaters.. Without your effort, knowhow, time and skills, we would not be achieving at the level we are today.

In terms of the committee, this year we are saying good-bye to a member who has served on the Committee for close to five years, Paula Bedford. Thank you Paula for your ongoing commitment to the club and the great work you have done particularly with Speed events including NZ Champs and Laurie Hastie. We will miss you. *(Come on up here)*

Sadly, times are changing and as a club it is becoming more and more difficult to get enough parents or other supporters or adult skaters to volunteer for either the committee or to help in other ways. Many of the current committee members have skaters who will be moving on from the sport over the next year or two, so we need a succession plan. If you want the club to stay alive we need more people putting their hand up to help.

Once the new committee is settled in we will be looking at how we can manage the current roles by spreading the load, and we will be reaching out to you, to our skating whānau for your help.

Introduction	<p>Tauranga Roller Skating Club was formed in June 2017. We are a growing club, and our focus is on developing our competitive skaters to world level and promoting Artistic Roller Skating in our region.</p> <p>In 2024 we partnered with the Mount Mustangs Inline Hockey Club (MMIH) to form Bay Roller Sports Inc. (BRSI). Through BRSI, TRSC and MMIH jointly hold the lease to a brand-new purpose-built roller-skating rink, Revolution Skate Center, at Mercury Bay Park, a Council owned community Sports Hub in Tauranga. As well as being the home rink for both TRSC and MMIH, RSC is used regularly by Moana Roller Derby Club and is available for other types of sporting clubs and community bookings through BRSI. Since opening the centre both MMIH and TRSC have grown significantly and booking availability at the rink is now limited.</p> <p>BRSI and both clubs also run regular Roller Discos, Open Skating and Holiday Skating sessions for the general public at RSC. These are growing in popularity.</p>
What skating sports are covered in your club?	<p>TRSC offers the Artistic Disciplines of Freestyle, Figures, Dance and Precision in Beginner, Novice and Preliminary groups through to international grades. The club also holds weekly Recreational classes for young and adult skaters, and our Kiwi Skate program is very popular. Excitingly, we recently introduced Speed Skating classes in Tauranga, and these have proven to be very popular. We are excited to have engaged Jamie Sutton as our Speed Skating coach who has represented NZ in both inline speed skating and short track speed skating.</p>
Club membership numbers (Total)	<p>Our membership has grown significantly in the last year. We now have 48 Club Members composed of competitive Artistic Roller Skaters, Life Members and Supporters/Committee Members – note 11 of these are Beginner Artistic and in the process of registering with NZFRS and will hopefully be trying for their first medal tests in November. In addition, we currently have 66 skaters enrolled in our recreational classes, which includes 26 skaters enrolled in our Kiwi Skate programme and 15 in our Young Rec class, 13 in our Adult class and 12 in our Speed class.</p> <p>We currently have 5 accredited Artistic coaches, 3 with SSL1 and 2 with Coach Accreditation Certificates plus 3 Learn to Skate Assistants and now our Speed coach.</p> <p>All in all, we have nearly quadrupled the size of our club community in the past year! We want to thank all our Volunteers, Coaches, Parents and Skaters for their hard work and success. We are all very proud to be members of TRSC and love the great community we have supporting us. We are continuing to seek new ways to engage more people with our club and the sport of Artistic Roller Skating!</p>

2024/25 has been a big year for TRSC; we moved into RSC and have established new recreational classes for kids and adults, grown our current and future coaching team, expanded our Artistic Disciplines to include Dance and Precision and added a new Roller Sport Discipline (Speed). We held our Grand Opening of Revolution Skate Centre in July which made headlines. Held a Speed Skating Workshop and many holiday skate sessions (open skate sessions and learn to skate sessions) and we have started running skating birthday parties for kids.

We held our first Medal Test Day at RSC in March, and our next one is booked for 2nd November this year. And, we have our first Beginner and Open Competition coming up in September. This competition was initially planned with the Regional Committee in hope to re-start the Regional Competitions on an annual basis, but due to a clash with another workshop it unfortunately meant there would be insufficient representation from clubs in our region. So, we decided to hold an Open Day to allow us to invite skaters from other regions. We plan for this event to become an annual activity during the September school holidays. We also offered our space and adjoining conference rooms for the Artistic Seminar originally when they were looking for venue proposals. It's all go!

We have held and intend to continue to hold Open Public Skating sessions at RSC during the school holidays with our RSC partners MMIH. These have been excellent for engaging the wider community. We estimate that more than 300 members of the public skated at RSC during these holiday programmes and they are a good way to sign up new members for recreational classes with TRSC as a result of the introduction of the rink and the enjoyment skaters gain from their time with us.

We also started regular Friday night Discos which are great fun, on average we get around 50 skaters each week and we are working on ways to increase these numbers. Income from the discos is used to provide better facilities for the rink and our founding clubs (MMIH and TRSC).

RSC held its official opening on July 20th and attendance was fantastic, thank you to all NZFRS officials who came. We were very excited with the great media and public response we received from this special day. You can read some of the articles here:

We are very lucky to have had our precision teams coached by Lisa Garrud from Auckland Waitakere Club who came down to Taruanga on a regular basis to work with our club member and Precision Team Manager, Kazna De Roles.</p> <p>Our club has recently introduced the discipline of Speed Skating, which began with a workshop in April run by Callum Campbell from Hastings and we ran our first class during Term 2. Currently this class has 12 skaters, and we have recently engaged world Speed Skater Jamie Sutton as our Speed coach. We are optimistic that class will grow in popularity over the coming months as we have attracted some from the MMIH community. We consider that offering Speed will help attract more males, older teenagers and parents to the sport of skating.</p> <p>On occasion RSC is also booked by Let's Roll Coaching. They are usually ramp and outdoor skaters but plan to hold other events at the rink and they work closely with SportsBOP.</p>
<p>What information can you share with other clubs that have worked well?</p>	<p>Running holiday programmes and establishing new recreational classes has been very successful. Providing a space for people to just come and skate without the formality or restriction of a class environment is also very important.</p> <p>We utilize Facebook and Instagram for advertising our classes to make the wider community aware of our classes and events and work closely with MMIH to build a strong culture of collaboration and partnership between our clubs and the environment at the rink.</p> <p>Keeping our class times and venues regular and consistent helps to maintain skaters' engagement and builds strong links and a sense of community between our class members and their coaches as well.</p> <p>We have been very successful this year in obtaining grant funding to help support our skaters costs (e.g. competition and travel and accommodation costs), club costs and purchasing club assets - engaging with fund representatives and seeking their guidance on timing of funding rounds and how to improve our chances of securing funding has been an invaluable part of our success. Many thanks to Jo Russell, our Treasurer who has worked so hard on obtaining grants this year.</p> <p>Our club members have also run several successful fundraisers this year. Amongst other things we have used some of these funds to purchase hire skates and beginner frames to support our community open Skate events (e.g. holiday programmes and Discos) helping to grow community awareness and enjoyment of our sport.</p> <p>We have experienced challenges this year, as have other clubs in our region, but we hope that through focussing on putting skaters needs first and applying the principles of transparency, fairness and Good Governance we can all enjoy a more harmonious, collaborative and positive season ahead. I want to particularly thank the NZFRS Board, the Artistic Committee and the Coaches Academy for working constructively with us to address some of the challenges we have faced.</p> <p>Finally, none of this is possible without the army of volunteers that support our club and our sport, a huge thank you to all of them and to all the judges and officials who have supported our skaters and coaches and make these competitions and events possible.</p>

These are an excellent opportunity to bring families into The Rink and often into the respective sections. These also serve as fundraisers for sections or international skaters. <i>Skate Fundraisers for NZ Teams and Skaters</i> - We have had a number of our members represent NZ in the last year across all 3 disciplines. Members have held public skate sessions as fundraisers to support their endeavours.</p> <p><u>Artistic Section</u> – Our Wanganui artistic section is very small. We have three competitive skaters and five learn to skate participants. However, the small group of learned to skate participants are slowly growing. A Coaching Enhancement Programme was delivered this year, featuring guest coach Gonzalo San Martín Peña from Chile, which contributed significantly to the development of our coaching team and players. Teams also participated actively in interclub fixtures and regional tournaments, helping to strengthen competitive experience and build connections across the wider hockey</p> <p><u>Speed Skating Section</u> – The Wanganui Speed Section successfully hosted three Omnibus competitions during May, June, and August, each attracting strong participation and positive engagement from both skaters and supporters. The North Island Indoor Championships were held at Jubilee Stadium in August. Although attendance was lower than anticipated, the event still provided exciting and competitive racing across all categories. The section continues to strengthen its foundation of developing athletes, with regular training sessions consistently drawing between 15 and 20 skaters. This steady level of participation highlights the positive growth, commitment, and enthusiasm within the local speed skating community.</p>

This valuable overseas experience allowed them to compete in local events and adapt to larger and more competitive pack sizes, contributing significantly to their development as athletes. At the Asian Roller Championships held in Jecheon, Korea, in July, Wanganui was represented by Mick Zhang, Tazia Parker, and Gabriella Valentine. All three athletes delivered strong performances against high-calibre international fields. Notably, Tazia led the field by a full lap in the 10km Elimination event before being disqualified on the final turn due to briefly leaving the track as a result of heat stress. In August, Chase Morpeth represented New Zealand at the World Games in Chengdu, China, an event held every four years. Chase described the experience as the highlight of his career, made even more memorable by the presence of his older brother, Christopher Sharrock, who served as team manager. Chase’s outstanding performance included a 10th-place finish in the 1000m event, during which he set two new New Zealand records—recording a time of 1:21.781 in the preliminary heat and improving it to 1:20.844 in the semi-final. <i>(The previous record of 1:21.872, set by Scott Arlidge in 2011 in Korea, is pending official ratification.)</i> A New Zealand team comprising Andrew Jones, Hadley Beech, Chase Morpeth, Emily Olthoft, and Mickayla McDonald also travelled to Beidaihe, China, to compete at the World Speed Championships.
