What activities have you had this year?	We have run our learn-to-skate classes which have adults and kids separate, an inline class, a jam class and three fun skate sessions.
Have you initiated any new activities?	Our fun skate sessions are new this year, originally introduced from SkateNZ funding, but we will try and get one in before Christmas once we are back to Level One.
How many club meetings have you run this year? i.e., committee meetings	We have run 12 committee meetings and an additional funding resolution meeting. We also ran a meeting with our experienced learn-to-skate coaches for their feedback and ideas on improvements to cater for increased numbers.
What are your member numbers? You may specify by discipline if desired.	Competitive: 28 Recreational: 370 with 280 from classes, 57 from jam, 33 from inline. Officials and Coaches: 9
Have you seen any growth?	We have seen huge growth. Our classes night has seen up to 140 people in attendance prior to lockdown. The 280 learn-to-skate members is up from a total of 253 for the entire year of 2020 & 146 from 2019. Our first fun skate had 25 people and the last one had around 180.
How many of your skaters have attended events hosted elsewhere? e.g., open day, training camp, workshop, etc.	Four of our skaters entered Laurie Hastie in Palmerston North and one of our skaters was to attend the Oceania Camp held in New Plymouth.

There has been a boom in skaters wanting to learn the basics on impala skates and inline artistic skates.</p> <p>The Thursday evening public sessions have been busy too.</p> <p>The Sunday family public sessions have often hosted 300 skaters over a 2-hour period.</p> <p>Our Artistic and Speed Teams run fundraising discos at the end of each month, which have been well attended.</p> <p>There are artistic classes all week, with sessions of figures, dance, and free style too.</p> <p>Speed training is held 3 times weekly.</p> <p>Our Club Open Fun Day was well attended by club members and some public.</p> <p>Speed hosted a fun speed race day in June with 20 skaters from Auckland, MSSC and Hamilton attending. Unfortunately, the next 2 monthly events were cancelled due to rain, the Sept one clashed with the North Island Open (which was Covid affected itself), then Covid-19 has cancelled our Sid Cooper Memorial Event in October.</p>
<p>How many club meetings have you run this year? i.e. committee meetings</p>	<p>9 committee meetings, plus 1 AGM</p> <p>We have had 1 committee member retire and 2 new committee members join. Our President, Vice-President and Secretary remain the same.</p>

We have lost a few competitive skaters due to going away to university, moving away, family loss and Covid. However, we have 2 adult skaters who are wanting to become credited coaches due to the increase in interest in lessons. So, we hope our numbers will increase.</p>

What's been your favourite success story this year?	Our speed coaches, Eileen Hughes and John Nation were awarded Speed Volunteers of the Year. They devote so much of their spare time to training the speed team. They help skaters with time, loan kit and skates, rides, and finances. There wouldn't be a speed team without them.
What information can you share with other clubs that have worked well?	Our Facebook page has been the best way to interact with the public. Advertising the fundraising events on each suburb of Hamilton's Facebook pages has greatly increased the attendance at these events.
Any further comments you'd like to make?	Covid-19 has affected the running of our club this year, again. However, we are looking forward to re-opening and getting going again. We thank NZFRS for ongoing support and leadership in our sport.

All the clubs in the region continue to support the sport nationally by skaters competing and officials officiating at National events. The speed clubs also support each other with the interclub competitions.

The South Canterbury Club is the still the biggest and most active club with a very good learners' session to feed the skaters to competition status. They have a group of supportive parents and some taking on coaching learning from the experienced ones. They continue to run a competition in the winter months attended by other clubs and still hold the Tour of Timaru.

Rollerland club is still our only club that has artistic skaters. It still battles for number, facilities to use and the costs involved.

The Christchurch club is now using the Rolleston new indoor facilities and back running learners' sessions. They are getting good attendance and prospects for more future registered skaters. This venue is large enough to hold regional and national events.

Attached to the report is reports from each club.

We were pleased to be able to have the Southern Region Day Speed event in October considering what had happened in prior months with Covid-19. It was the first large event since the Banked Tracks. Timaru still remains the venue as a very good indoor venue and where the bulk of the skaters are. We are also pleased for the continual support from the Top of South Region skaters. As usual it was a busy day but a good chance for some great racing.

We usually receive funding from Pub Charity but the affect of covid-19 lockdowns on their funding meant they did not have same funds available. Fortunately, we are in a good financial situation to carry the short fall. However, we still need to be mindful that events pay for themselves.

The Art discipline was able to hold the Areas this year and these were held in Nelson. The nationals were held in Whanganui just recently and skaters competed from Rollerland with some medal results. As a region we are still considering how to financially support the Area competition as it is not cost effective at present.

The Speed national were supported by three of our clubs with South Canterbury club having the largest contingent. That club continues to perform well and won the Unity Trophy.

There were no international competitions in this reporting period due to Covid-19 and looks unlikely that there will be 2021 Speed Worlds. There were some disappointed skaters but some are still young enough to compete in future years. We hope the things settle that we can have Oceania's in 2022.

Overall, the region is financially sound but all but one club has a good number of skaters. However as mentioned there is some promise for the future particularly is the Christchurch clubs can boost their numbers.

Thanks to the delegates, our Secretary and Treasurer for the work they do for us.
